The HCA board, elected at the October 23rd annual meeting, held an organizational meeting in November at which it selected officers, set the chairs for critical committees, set a regular meeting schedule, and set the annual dues rate to \$20. See the lefthand column for organizational details.

PKD AIRPORT

WHOOPS! I meant 737s, not 747s!

My apologies for the typographical error in the last Hawthorne Newsletter. In writing about PKD Airport's plans to rebuild the remaining older taxiways so that the entire airport could ROUTINELY accommodate planes weighing at least 105,000 lbs. (and some weighing considerably more), I erroneously said that the expansion would allow 747s to use PKD Airport.

That was wrong, as several people have kindly pointed out. 747s are simply ENORMOUS and couldn't possibly use PKD Airport. I had meant to say 737s--specifically Boeing Business Jets. Along with DC-9's, Boeing Business Jets are ALREADY occasionally using PKD Airport, even though they are considerably heavier than the weight allowed by DeKalb County's 1976 ordinance. That ordinance is supposed to prohibit planes weighing more than a MAXIMUM of 75,000 lbs. from using the PKD Airport--except with special permission.

WHY IS THIS ISSUE IMPORTANT? Busy PKD Airport, just two miles as the plane flies from most of our homes, appears to be in a process of transformation from a general aviation airport (its present official status) to a commercial airport capable of accommodating much heavier and generally noisier planes. A Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) administrative regulation currently under consideration would MANDATE that any airport that is physically CAPABLE of accommodating larger planes do so. If this new FAA regulation is adopted, DeKalb County would lose control over the weight of planes using its County-owned airport to an appointive agency of the Federal Government.

At its August 26, 2003, meeting, the DeKalb County Board of Commissioners acted to try to head off the possibility of loss of control over PKD Airport by voting unanimously to require that the remaining PKD taxiways be reconstructed so they could routinely accommodate NO MORE than a MAXIMUM weight of 75,000 lbs. for dual-wheeled aircraft. At the PKD Airport Advisory Board meeting on October 15, 2003, however, PKD Airport Director Lee Rimmel repeatedly and explicitly indicated that he was, instead, moving ahead with earlier plans to rebuild the PKD taxiways in question to the level of the rest of the airport-- a MAXIMUM of at least 105,000 lbs.

Will the DeKalb County Commissioners insist that DeKalb CEO Vernon Jones and PKD Airport Director Rimmel implement their ordinance, or will they let the DeKalb County Administration get away with disregarding their will and rebuilding the taxiways to a level almost TWICE the MAXIMUM weight that they voted for on August 26, 2003? The answer to this question will greatly influence whether the Hawthorne area and other parts of northeast DeKalb County will remain a desirable place to live in the future.

To protect our investments and rights as homeowners, community representatives have retained legal counsel to pursue litigation to hold DeKalb County to its promise to limit the size of aircraft using PKD. I believe that we stand at a critical point in our efforts to try to protect our neighborhood from the threat of heavier and generally noisier planes at PKD Airport.

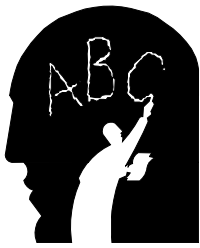
ARMSTRONG GREENSPACE Approx. 10 acres off Briarcliff near Shallowford acquired in 2003 by DeKalb's greenspace program from the estate of Mary Armstrong,

In December, the county removed a collapsed structure and other hazardous materials from the site and installed a gate. During the winter, the county's invasive plant control contractors will clear some overgrown non-native vines with additional work planned for the growing season. The county plans to begin a base ecological survey of the property around mid-winter -- cataloging existing natural features.

The Flair Forest Garden Club was told that the site is suitable for passive recreation (walking trails, nature education, etc), and that neighborhood input on its development would be welcomed. HCA plans to hold a winter meeting of neighbors, churches, schools, & representatives a few nature-oriented non-profit organizations. Others interested in contributing viewpoints should contact HCA President Beth Nathan.

SCHOOLS

Neighborhood schools are not expected to last. Most 40-year-old buildings will be closed in favor of new mega schools that are more efficient in moving kids thru. Target sizes are 1000 for elementary, 1200-1400 for middle and 1400-1600 for high schools.

New elementary schools built or under construction are all designed to accommodate 1000 or more kids. New Middle schools are also larger.

No plan is in place to "fix" Henderson middle school. Formerly a High school, it now houses 1400-1500 students. Tucker Middle will help some with overcrowding but moving 6th grades from all the feeders will offset some of that.

The promised \$92 million from SPLOST II to help improve Lakeside High school and its feeders will not be available. A sales receipt shortfall for the past 2 years has resulted in over \$100 million reduction in projected funds.

Attendance lines will need to be revised as new schools come on line. Here's an opportunity to address the high concentration of apartment kids at Hawthorne vs. other area schools.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

Spurred by recent home burglaries (Oct/Nov daytime, January night) and thefts from cars, HCA is formulating a new Neighborhood Watch plan to replace the non-sustainable system that fell into disuse. An e-mail listserv is being considered.

There are many ways you can make yourself and the neighborhood more secure, including ...

Be observant and CALL 911 if you see something suspicious ... like

- a van or panel truck slowly cruising
- walkers or solicitors who seem out of place
- unexpected activity at a neighbor's house

Make your home and your vehicle less inviting targets ...

- Make it look like you're home even when you're not, with indoor lights and/or a radio on timers. Make sure newspapers and mail don't pile up.
- Share your travel plans with a trusted neighbor or two.
- Make good use of outdoor lighting.
- If you have a garage, use it for vehicles.
- Don't leave anything tempting (cell phone, bags/boxes, etc) visible in a car parked outside of a garage.

Make it more difficult for a burglar to steal your identity ...

- Lock up your financial records.
- Deal quickly with financial mail.
- Thoroughly destroy any pre-approved credit card solicitations you don't want; don't just throw them in the trash whole.

TRAFFIC SAFETY

As 2003's Traffic Calming project winds down, HCA's focus shifts to gathering information on localized traffic problems and measures that can be utilized to ameliorate them. Please contact HCA board member Sandy McKittrick with your observations, thoughts and questions.

Betty Phillips reports that the County's Traffic Calming Department is still 'counting' the petitions for the seven areas that considered traffic calming last summer. Final counts have been determined for Flair Knoll Drive, Hawthorne Drive, Briarmoor Road and Sylvan Ramble Road, all of which failed to achieve the required 65% affirmative vote.

In November, Robbie Stadter began a traffic calming petition process on behalf of Sherbrooke Drive and Court. The county now requires that the original request be signed by 20% of the affected property owners in order to be placed on their traffic study list.

In the upcoming weeks, the Hawthorne PTA will be selling yard signs that promote safe driving. Cost is \$15 each. More info: Laura Goldsmith, 770/939-0345 or lgoldsmith@mindspring.com.

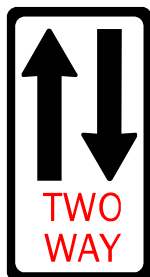
