

SHALLOWFORD NEIGHBORHOOD CENTER

After meeting with ARC (Atlanta Regional Commission) representatives this fall, it became clear that our area (whether the Neighborhood Center area or the Shallowford Corridor as a whole) stood little chance of being selected for one of their LCI (Liveable Centers Initiative) grants when other areas in DeKalb have greater need. In late fall, a TABASCO core group met with the Georgia Conservancy to apply for their **Blueprints for Successful Communities** program which combines public meetings with graduate student work to develop visions for a future that a community can agree upon. We are in the running for fall 2009 or spring 2010, and expect to hear something around March. In the meantime, start thinking about what you'd put on a list of Assets and Challenges for the Shallowford Road area. That would be the topic for the first Blueprints public meeting. Contact tabasco@northbriarcliff.org for more info.

INTERCHANGE GARDENs: Regular workdays, for cleanup and/or planting, at the Shallowford I-85 interchange will continue, weather-permitting, on the third Saturday of every month, starting at 8:30 am. Contact interchange@northbriarcliff.org for more info.

ZONING / DEVELOPMENT

The new year brings welcome changes in the operation of the DeKalb County Board of Commissioners regular meetings. They now have the legal power to preside over and set their own agenda for these meetings. Also, the public portion of commission meetings will precede the business portion, a reversal from previous agendas. The public portion of the meeting includes applications for amending the land use plan, rezones, special land use permits (SLUPs) and public comments. No more long hours of waiting will have to be endured by the citizens there for the public hearings.

The public comments section of the meeting gives every citizen an opportunity to speak to the commission on any topic, whether on that day's agenda or not. The citizen is required to complete and submit a "name card" prior to the beginning of the public comments period (shortly after 9 am). Thirty (30) minutes is allocated for the comments periods; each citizen is limited to 3 minutes.

DeKalb is conducting a re-write of the current Zoning Ordinance. The update will implement the policies of the recently adopted Comprehensive Plan, the Comprehensive Transportation Plan and the Livable Center Initiatives. The Comprehensive Plan designations encourage higher density redevelopment with taller heights.

Currently in the application process is a request for a "Town Center" designation for 68.25 acres for a new mixed use re-development known as "The Park Druid Hills" located at I-85 and North Druid Hills Road, formerly known as "Executive Park". Included would be 2.8 million square feet of residential, retail, office and hotel space. About 17 new buildings would be constructed including a 12-story tower.

A mixed use re-development application under a "Town Center" designation has been filed for the Williamsburg Apartments 37-acre property near the intersection of North Druid Hills and Clairmont; it has elicited much controversy.

DeKalb County Commissioners deferred to 2009 a proposed ordinance that defines and allows a height limit of 35 feet on new houses. As proposed, the existing "residential infill overlay district" ordinance would cease to exist; no further RIODs (28-foot height restriction) could be established but existing RIODs would be grandfathered and protected. Opposition from citizens was expressed against removing the choice of obtaining a RIOD.

On February 19, Henderson Middle School will be hosting Henderson History Day, a program based on The Henderson Project. The purpose of The Henderson Project is to preserve the history of the area and gather historical memorabilia.

PAUL WOMACK, NEW SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER, interview by Harrison Rogers

Paul Womack, a long term resident of DeKalb County, is the newly elected District 4 School Board Member. He previously served on the school board 16 years ago. Shortly after retiring as a successful business owner of a large medical equipment company, Mr. Womack was asked to again run and serve on the School Board by family and friends.

I asked Mr. Womack what he sees as the most important issues facing the DeKalb School System as a whole and particularly, the Lakeside School district. Without hesitation, he said the 2010 school system's budget is the most pressing problem. With the failing economy and decreasing tax revenues, the school system will likely have to make substantial cuts. Mr. Womack said his fear is that the Board will start immediately looking at student services and not administration as the place to cut. He believes that the board should first consider cutting administrative costs such as cell phones, personal cars, non-essential staff and annual salaries over \$100,000. Mr. Womack said the Board also needs to look into why DeKalb is losing state funds to other counties.

As a Lakeside parent since 2002, I mentioned to Mr. Womack that for the past several years I have noticed that the school seems less prepared to teach. There is a shortage of desks, certain classes and class schedules, books and teachers. There are now around 21 trailers, up from 18 just a year ago. Mr. Womack said that this is an overcrowding problem and is a direct result of the "No Child Left Behind" federal mandate. The intent of holding schools accountable for student performance is a good idea. The problem lies in the way it is implemented. Lakeside and other Schools of Excellence are forced to receive students from failing schools. The sending schools are losing their best students, parents, and funds. More emphasis needs to be given to building up the sending schools, rather than automatically relinquishing their students to receiving schools like Lakeside. Parents and students need to be informed of what actions the administration is taking to improve their school. He said that this is a national problem and that the Obama administration will hopefully start working on improving the way the program is implemented and funded.

Mr. Womack said that Lakeside has always had an informed and active PTA. As long as parents remain vigilant, the school will remain strong. He encouraged our membership to be organized and express concerns to the Board. He concluded by offering to meet with the NBCA and said he is looking forward to working for a better school system. MARY SCOTT NATURE PRESERVE

NBCA has no new information about the contract to "develop" Mary Scott Nature Preserve nor its timeline, but we continue to work on obtaining such information. Also, the hoped-for plan for a county-neighborhood partnership in streambank restoration is in limbo. PDK / OPEN DEKALB

Open DeKalb is on the move, having retained a new legal team to pursue enforcement of the 66,000-pound size limit on aircraft using PDK Airport.

Our new legal counsel, Berman, Fink & Van Horn, P.C., are experienced litigation attorneys in a medium-sized law firm in Buckhead. Ben Fink and Chuck Van Horn live in the neighborhoods directly affected by PDK Airport flight activity and are sympathetic and knowledgeable about our concerns. Open DeKalb board member, Susan Gouinlock, Esq., who worked on the successful Open Records case against DeKalb and PDK, has brought the new firm up to speed and will continue to work with them on the weight limit case.

Ben and Chuck's first action has been to seek full compliance by the County with our hard won Court Order of October 2006, pursuant to which the County was to produce ALL of the information it had withheld prior to the Open Records Case victory. As usual, the County is balking at doing its Airport business in public, but our lawyers are on it. Their primary focus is on obtaining compliance by the County with the 66,000-pound weight/size limit on aircraft using PDK, and they are using all available means to do so. We will announce specifics on that effort as soon as they can be made public.
