N'HOOD WATCH – Thank-You, Center Precinct

The NBCA area sent a message of appreciation to DeKalb Police Center Precinct personnel starting late on Thursday March 4 and through the day of March 5, in the way of a food spread and a small gift. Evergreen Hills Garden Club members started the ball rolling, with their pledges to contribute muffins, breakfast breads, fruit juices, etc. A wider neighborhood email, plus one to the entire NBCA listserv brought even more individual contributions. NBCA contributed funds for the completion of the “spread”.

Each police shift received its own “spread” of refreshments. The process began with the “Morning Watch” –the ones who come on near midnight and “watch” the early A.M. hours – because not only is that the beginning of any given 24-hour day, those are the ones who often are the last ones included in any cycle of events. Focal points for the spread décor included a “North Briarcliff” street sign topper and an Evergreen Hills neighborhood sign made by professional photographer Chuck Rogers.



The event was deeply appreciated by the various personnel who partook of the goodies. There were lots of stories exchanged; it was a very welcome opportunity to meet one another in a casual setting instead of “business”. A lot of the top command officers took a minute to come in and speak to us and welcome us to the Precinct. Everyone was quite interested in where we are located, how active the community is, and (to them) how little trouble they experience from this area. Several people expressed interest or surprise that we came specifically for each shift, rather than just bringing a large batch of food and drinks, and just leaving them all day and all night. {continued on page 6}

RE-IMAGINING SHALLOWFORD

TABASCO's February 13's public meeting was postponed, due to a snowstorm. Re-scheduling has been problematic with different parties favoring different dates. While NBCA is still actively pursuing an April date, it appears likely that the meeting will be re-scheduled for Saturday, May 22, at St Pius. If not then, the next probable date would be in the autumn. NBCA will publicize the new date as widely as possible, once it is known with certainty. See previous newsletters for more info on the importance of this public meeting.

The TABASCO coalition wrote a letter of support for a DeKalb Planning Department application for an ARC Community Choices grant application for this area. This could help us move further into design considerations. TABASCO meets monthly & operates a discussion group. See http://groups.yahoo.com/group/DECA_TABASCO/

DeKalb County commissioned the Livable Communities Coalition to conduct a Workforce Housing Study in 2009. The results will be presented at a meeting tentatively re-scheduled for April 29.



INTERCHANGE GARDENS: Regular workdays, for cleanup and/or planting, at the Shallowford I-85 interchange continue, weather-permitting, on the third Saturday of every month, starting at 8:30 am. In the past few months, the Dresden East Civic Association (on the Dresden side of I-85) has been providing most of the volunteers for this joint project. Where are NBCA's volunteers? I-85 NOISE BARRIERS. A DECA (Dresden East Civic Assn) resident reports that a representative in GaDOT's Air and Noise Department told her that Congressmen Hank Johnson (District 4) and John Lewis (District 5) submitted a request to Congress during Christmas of 2009 to have funds earmarked through Congress for noise barrier construction along the I-85 corridor in NE Atlanta. NBCA board member Michael Gross will track this item.

HAWTHORNE ELEMENTARY

- ▶ Hawthorne recently became a partner of the Georgia **Safe Routes to School** program. This program strives to increase the number of children walking or rolling (by bike, wheelchair, scooter) to school safely. The program can benefit participating children by increasing their physical activity and providing some fresh air on their way to and from school. In 1969, approximately 50% of children walked or bicycled to school, and 87% of children living within one mile of school did. Today, fewer than 15% of schoolchildren walk or bicycle to school. As a result, kids today are less active, less independent, and less healthy. The Safe Routes to School program can also benefit the larger community by reducing traffic and air pollution around the school. As much as 20 to 30% of morning traffic is generated by parents driving their children to schools, and traffic-related crashes are the top cause of death and major injury for children in the U.S. ages 1 to 17. FAA PROPOSAL TO LOWER HARTSFIELD AIRSPACE OVER PDK RAISES CONCERNS

In early December 2009, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) announced plans to lower the height at which Hartsfield jets could fly over many areas of metro Atlanta by at least 1,000 feet. Over PDK Airport, in particular, the minimum height at which Hartsfield jets could fly under the new proposal would drop by 3,000 feet from the current 8,000-foot ceiling to 5,000 feet above sea level (or 4,000 feet above ground level). Although it is unlikely that Hartsfield jets would actually fly at such low levels in the areas immediately adjacent to PDK Airport, they certainly would be able to fly at lower levels than they do at present.

The PDK Airport administration is actively opposing these proposed FAA airspace changes over PDK Airport, on the grounds that the changes are likely to have a negative impact (1) on PDK Airport operations, which will be compressed into a narrower band of airspace because PDK aircraft must fly below the Hartsfield level, and (2) on the surrounding neighborhoods, because the compression of PDK flight operations will mean that more aircraft using PDK are likely to have to fly longer at lower altitudes over residential neighborhoods than at present. Areas as far as ten miles or more away from PDK that are not currently bothered by PDK operations might begin to be bothered by PDK noise, although neighborhoods within about a four mile radius of PDK Airport (which includes the NBCA area) are less likely to see a significant increase in noise and pollution levels beyond those they already experience.

Several public meetings have been held to discuss the potential impact of the proposed FAA changes and how the public might most effectively let their views be

known. On February 17, PDK Watch took the unusual step of inviting Mike Van Wie, the Assistant PDK Airport Director, to present his reasons for opposing the FAA proposals at a public meeting sponsored by PDK Watch--a meeting at which a variety of other opinions were also presented. On March 1, the FAA gave three public presentations on its plans and solicited public comment on the proposal. Other public meetings have also been held, and the DeKalb County Commission has passed a resolution opposing the proposed FAA changes.

If people would like to register their views about the proposed FAA changes to Atlanta's Class B Airspace, they can do so prior to the April 5 2010 deadline for public comment (although comments will also probably be accepted for an additional week beyond that date) by sending their comments--in triplicate--to: Mr. Mark Ward/ Manager, Operations Support Group/ Eastern Services Area, Air Traffic Organization/ Federal Aviation Administration/ P.O. Box 20636/ Atlanta, GA 30320.

Based upon listening to all the public comments at the three FAA public sessions on March 1, my impression is that the types of concerns that the FAA is most likely to take seriously are those stressing the negative impact the changes might have on PDK Airport operations, rather than expressing concerns about potential negative impact on the surrounding neighborhoods (which doesn't appear to be of much concern to the FAA).

NEW DEKALB PARKS/REC DIRECTOR, Roy Wilson

The Civic Association Network (central DeKalb neighborhood leaders) met with DeKalb's new Parks/Rec director, Roy Wilson, March 3 at Leafmore Clubhouse. Commissioner Rader was also in attendance. Roy Wilson comes to DeKalb from the Nashville Parks Dept, which evidently has a pretty good reputation. He wanted us to know that ...

- He doesn't believe in making promises that he can't keep.
- He sees needs within DeKalb Parks for improvements particularly in aesthetics and activities.
- He promises parks/rec staff will be responsive to citizen communications.

Staff has been shuffled/re-structured. The current Deputy Directors are Marvin Billups (Recreation Programs) & Gary Dalton (Maintenance). Parks Development is now a part of Infrastructure under Ted Rhinehart. There is a Project Managers group which draws several departments together; Bob Sims heads up the Project Managers group and reports to Ted Rhinehart. Greenspace Acquisition (headed by Susan Hood; Dave Butler is in this group) is also under Infrastructure. DeKalb County is negotiating a potential relationship with Park Pride Atlanta, which describes itself as: "the only organization that works with communities all over Atlanta to improve their parks. Each year Park Pride coordinates more than 15,000 hours of volunteer work in Atlanta parks, develops new conceptual park plans for neighborhood parks and helps start many Friends of the Park groups."

All told, we provided 5 dozen bagels, 6 tubs of cream cheese, 6 home-baked loaves of pumpkin bread, 3 plates of home-baked crumb cake, 6 loaves of home-baked breads – whole wheat, white, rye; 58 individual yogurt cups, 5 half-gallon containers of fruit juice, 3 gallons of coffee (with other hot-drink mixes also available), 80 boxes of raisins, and a large selection of fresh fruit – bananas (the most popular!), apples, oranges, grapes; and 2 large bottles of sodas. Now THAT's an amazing turnout! And, as one officer noted, there were NO doughnuts! Another stereotype avoided!

MARY SCOTT NATURE PRESERVE – work in progress

Trail layout flags that were placed in early winter seemed to develop legs of their own and required re-staking. The loop trail, recently constructed, is expected to take the most traffic and to be the most accessible. There will be another layer of stone chips over the base layer now in place. Additional trail sections will be surfaced with wood chips. There are already reports of small motorcycles racing around and around the trails.

Many accessories (trash barrels, benches, tables, bike rack, etc) have been purchased and are in stock. A good number of native trees and shrubs have been obtained; a planting plan is being developed. Plantings of young oaks and other trees are planned, several in the parking lot area. The front "meadow" could be an open play area or re-planted for beauty. A "ditch" has been dug to carry the water that flows through the new culvert under the driveway; the Transportation Dept said it was needed. As constructed, the ditch appears to be very susceptible to erosion, so a plan for water-loving plants along its banks is being considered. How much screening (noise / visual) from the road is appropriate? I hope to make this all a group discussion via a new discussion (friends-of-MSNP) listserv very soon. Work on the invasive bamboo is being planned, there may be a need to organize volunteers to help with this effort. I

still need a co-chair for the NBCA Parks Committee; there's too much organizing for one person.

We may try some 5-7 pm weekday workdays to supplement Saturday morning workdays this spring. Besides bamboo, privet needs to be removed. We think we will be able to borrow 2 privet-puller devices. Ivy is again growing up trees and needs to be cut back. Specific "beds" of native plants will be targeted for special maintenance.

A Chamblee/Decatur concrete sign that was found on the property and stored away will likely be embedded in a short section of sidewalk yet to be poured. Two bluebird houses, donated by the Georgia Native Plant Society, need to be mounted. Whether the front sign will say Park or Nature Preserve is still uncertain.

Once the majority of the hardscape work has been completed, the plan is for NBCA, an Eagle Scout leader and other interested citizens to develop a "what else" list for the park. BUILDING COMMUNITY VALUE(S)

Though the recession's effect on the real estate market has been noticeable, the NBCA area has not suffered as much as other neighborhoods in DeKalb. However, properties are staying on the market longer, and many people have had to lower their asking prices in order to attract buyers. Some owners, unable to sell in the current climate, have chosen to rent their homes instead.

As a civic association with voluntary membership, NBCA does not have any legal authority over homeowners regarding how they choose to market their properties (i.e. renting versus selling), and the neighborhoods that comprise the NBCA area do not generally contain any deed restrictions that compel homeowners to maintain their property in prescribed ways. If you, as a neighbor, have concerns about property upkeep that may represent a violation of county ordinances, you may wish to contact DeKalb Code Enforcement (770-724-7940 or codeenforce@co.dekalb.ga.us) to verify that the situation does violate code and, if so, what can be done about it. On the other hand, if you admire something another neighbor has done, compliment them on it.

NBCA is organized for betterment of the North Briarcliff Community through such efforts as:
